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FINAL CONFERENCE IN GDAŃSK: CELEBRATING IMPACT, SHARING LEARNING

As the Newcomers@Work project approached its conclusion, partners came together in Gdańsk, Poland for a powerful moment of exchange and reflection.

The event was not only about showcasing outcomes, but also about engaging in dialogue around inclusion, integration, and the challenges young migrants face in entering the labour market. It was a space for inspiration, connection, and future thinking.



NATIONAL CONFERENCES ACROSS EUROPE: LOCAL VOICES, SHARED PURPOSE



Alongside the final transnational event, each partner country organised its own national conference, bringing the project closer to local communities. These events involved youth workers, employers, NGOs, public authorities and NEET participants – all sharing experiences, insights and lessons learned from their national implementation journeys.

These local gatherings highlighted how the Newcomers@Work tools were adapted in different contexts and sparked discussions about policy alignment, sustainability, and long-term cooperation at regional level.

MORE THAN 350 YOUNG PEOPLE SUPPORTED

Over the course of the pilot phase, more than 350 young NEETs with migrant backgrounds participated in personalised activities designed to support their integration into the labour market. Through individual mentoring and on-the-job training, they explored their strengths, gained practical experience, and improved their employability and confidence.

The work was made possible through close collaboration between youth workers and employers, who implemented the tools co-developed during the project. These local partnerships helped ensure that each experience was adapted to the context and needs of the participants – and that no one walked the path alone.





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EXPLORE ALL PROJECT RESULTS ON THE WEBSITE

All key resources developed in the Newcomers@Work project are now available online. These include the Curriculum with four thematic modules, the Digital Toolbox for youth workers and employers, the Implementation Guide for adapting the methodology to different local contexts and the Curriculum Guide offering practical guidance for its use. Each resource is grounded in real testing and feedback, and ready to be reused or adapted by organisations working on youth employability and migrant inclusion.
